#### THE BEEHIVE

As with many of the symbols represented in Speculative Masonry, before it was incorporated into the rituals of our fraternity, bees and beehives meant different things to various cultures. One case can be found in Hinduism where gods were frequently associated with bees, including Vishnu, Krishna, and Indra. These three are referred to as Madhava, the nectar-born ones, and are represented by the bee.

Another instance can be found in the ancient Egyptian culture where the bee represented both royalty and their obedient subject. One example shows that as early as 3,500 BCE, the bee represented the King of Lower Egypt.



#### The Third Degree

It is unclear precisely when the Beehive was integrated into Masonic ritual, but as W.M. Sollie divulged it was mentioned as early as 1724 in Ireland. (Ireland was under England at that time so the ritual was that of the first English Grand Lodge)

In the lecture of The Master Mason degree, (Antient York) it is taught that the Beehive is emblematic of Industry and recommends the practice of that virtue to all created beings, from the highest seraph in the heavens, to the lowest reptile of the dust. It teaches us, that as we come into the world rational and intelligent beings, so we should ever be industrious ones, never sitting down contented while our fellow-creatures around us are in want, especially when it is in our power to relieve them, without inconvenience to ourselves or family.

When reflecting on our ancestors in the operative lodges, the old meaning of Industry, it described how the guilds' work was completed without modern heavy machinery. In this antiquated system of industry, individual stonemasons were assigned specific tasks based on their skill level, whether it was carrying a stone, or building tools, or sculpting a proper piece for the structure. Every man from the apprentice to the master was essential for completing the job just as every bee has its duty and contributes to the success of the hive.

While Masonic lodges may be different in practice, the parallels with the Beehive remain the same. Lodges follow a structure that requires workers on all levels to make the lodge function and be successful. Master Masons and more seasoned brothers must impart their knowledge and experience with our Entered Apprentices. We all must do our part to make lodge endeavors successful and harmonious. Considering the Masons' diligent and cooperative nature, stemming back to the Operative Masons of the middle ages, it is no wonder the Beehive came to be the powerful symbol in our work that it is today.

#### The Ark

The Ark refers to the Ark of Noah. All the Ancient Mysteries seem to have contained allusions more or less clear to the deluge and Noah's Ark. There being so many other symbols common to Masonry and the Mysteries, it is not surprising to find the Ark also employed as a Masonic symbol. To the pre-Christian ages, the idea of a regeneration, or a new birth, was as familiar as it is to us. In the Ancient Mysteries, we are best able to judge, the tradition of the Deluge and the Ark, by which the human race was reputed to have been both purified and perpetuated, was in a variety of forms employed to teach this doctrine of regeneration.

In the Funeral Ritual of the Egyptians, it is by means of the Ark or solar boat that the deceased passed to Aahlu (paradise) or Amenti. (Hades) We are all familiar with the Greek myth which represents Charon as ferrying the shades of the departed over the river Styx. Thus it is seen that the Ark has for ages been the symbol of the passage from this world to the next. We attach to it a very similar meaning, it symbolizes to that power or influence by which we are fitted for and raised to a higher state of existence in the life that is to come.



The Anchor

The anchor does not seem to have belonged to ancient symbolism. St. Paul appears first to have employed it as an emblem of hope of immortality, and bliss after this life. Kip, in his Catacombs of Rome, says that the primitive Christians looked upon life as a stormy voyage and that of their safe arrival in port the anchor was a symbol. Mrs. Jameson says that the anchor is the Christian symbol of immovable firmness, hope, and patience. Though apparently of Christian origin as a symbol, there is nothing narrow or sectarian in its significance, and it may with equal propriety be employed by Jew and Gentile, as well as by all others who share in the belief of a peaceful place of abode hereafter for those who have made a proper use of this life. In the symbol of the Ark, and Anchor we therefore see again, pressed upon our attention the doctrines of Deity, the Mediator, regeneration, resurrection. and immateriality.



#### The Hourglass

An hourglass is an early device used to track measures of time. It became popular in the 15th century for its dependability, finding regular use on ships, in kitchens, and in churches. While today the hourglass is not used for time telling time, its literal depiction of the past, present, and future have helped it endure the centuries as a popular symbol. Often depicted with wings, it represents humanity's fleeting nature, emphasizing that time will run out for each individual.

The first encounter of the Hourglass is during the lecture of the third degree, (Antient York) where it is explained to be an emblem of human life. It represents the continuous passing of time and serves as a reminder that life is finite. Additionally, the two containers of the hourglass are an analogy on their own: that the need to flip the hourglass signifies the cycle between life and death. It also denotes the notion that we must be able to reverse our perceptions, attitudes, and actions at times for us to move forward.

The completion of the Master Mason degree is almost certainly not a Brother's first experience with an hourglass, symbolically or otherwise. What makes the Hourglass unique in how it is employed in Freemasonry is the challenge it poses to brethren. As with all the symbols and lessons taught in our fraternity, the Hourglass is meant to encourage Freemasons to live a full life and make the most of our time.

It is a reminder to work for a life of compassion, honesty, and integrity so that we may improve not only our own lives but those in our community as well.
